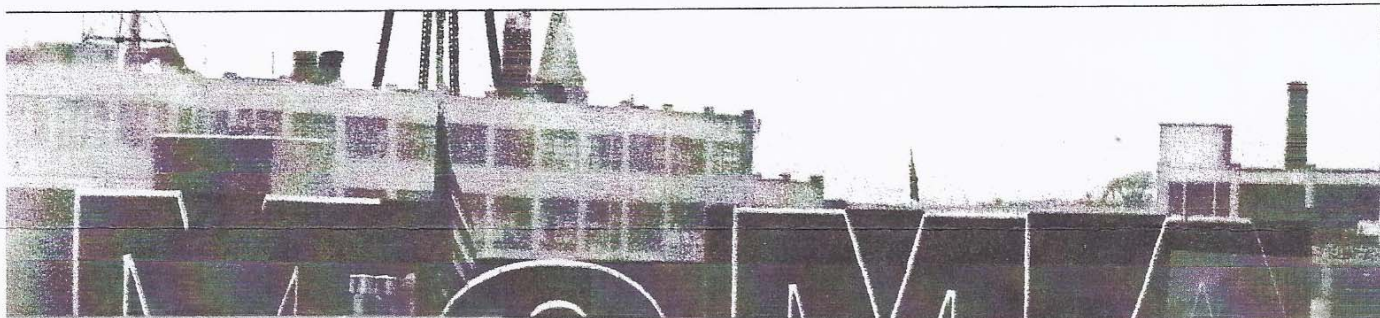

More than met the eye in New York and Boston will greet visitors when the exhibition

"Jacqueline Kennedy: The White House Years — Selections From the John F. Kennedy Library and Museum" opens on Saturday at the Corcoran Gallery of Art in Washington. The show, through Sept. 30, features more than 70 original gowns, dresses, suits and accessories worn by Mrs. Kennedy and to display objects associated with her efforts in White House restoration, preser-

vation and the arts. But the exhibition in Washington includes photo murals and handwritten letters not seen in New York or Boston that document Mrs. Kennedy's efforts to preserve historic structures and to foster the capital's cultural life. Information: (800) 551-7328 or (202) 432-7328.
