EVENT DIRECTOR

Margaret Meyer joined the British Council as Director of Literature in February 2001. She has worked as a journalist, critic, composer and scriptwriter and immediately prior to joining the British Council was Head of Information at the Royal National Institute for the Blind. From 1988-1990 she worked as a literary editor for Hodder and Stoughton publishers (New Zealand) and from 1990-1995 ran the Museum of London's publishing programme. Her published work includes literary and arts criticism, poetry and film scripts.

EVENT CHAIRMEN

Christopher Bigsby has been Chairman of the Cambridge Seminar since 1984, when he succeeded the late Malcolm Bradbury. He is Professor of American Literature at the University of East Anglia. He has published three novels as well as over twenty major works of criticism. He is regarded as a world authority on Arthur Miller. He is a well known broadcaster and frequently interviews prominent authors at the Royal National Theatre.

Co-chairman of the seminar is **Damian Grant**, who is Senior Lecturer in English at the University of Manchester. He has been present at every Cambridge Seminar since its inception. He is a prominent literary critic, whose latest book is on Salman Rushdie for the British Council *Writers and Their Work* series. He has also written about D.H.Lawrence and about modern poetry.
