John F. Andrews Carlsbad native honored by the British Empire

## Carlsbad son receives British honor

CARLSBAD - From Carlsbad roots to a recent recognition as Honorary Officer of the Civil Division of the Order of the British Empire, hometown boy John F. Andrews has made his mark in the world.

Andrews' nomination for the prestigious O.B.E. (Order of the British Empire) Award was made by David Blagborough, director of U.S.A. of the British Council, a cultural arm of the government, he explained.

However, it was his wife Jan, also a native New Mexican, who quietly conspired and provided the necessary background information so he would be completely surprised, he

"I was totally surprised when I found out that I would be honored and the ceremony would take place," Andrews said, explaining the ceremony was held at the residence of Sir Christopher Meyers, British ambassador in Washington, complete with a chauffeured ride in a Rolls Royce.

"It's not called an induction, it's called an honor," he added during a telephone interview. "As I understand, two rosters of honors are bestowed annually by Buckingham Palace, Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip. One is given around the New Year and the other about this time."

"It (the ceremony) was a very nice occasion - a very nice ego trip," Andrews stated with a laugh. "I can't think of a better way to take an ego trip than in a Rolls Royce."

Reading the list of Andrews' accomplishments may seem overwhelming and his credentials intimidating, but he's just a regular guy with a sense of humor and a longing to

catch a flight to visit his hometown of Carlsbad.

Andrews was born in Carlsbad in 1942 to Frank and Lucille Andrews. Ever since he can remember, he's had an interest in the arts, although a more visual interest during his youthful school days. This visual interest resulted in sign painting for Odorless Cleaners, Fordtown and even a highway sign, he said.

During his school days in Carlsbad his eighth-grade block teacher, Harry Tatarian, made a lasting impression on him.

"Mr. Tatarian had a certain warmth about him and he had high standards," explained Andrews. "He gave me an assignment once because he thought I was watching too much television. I did a paper on the Civil War and my interest has continued with the Shakespeare connection to the Civil War.

Andrews graduated valedictorian of Carlsbad High School's Class of 1961 and then went on to receive his bachelor's degree from Princeton, master's degree from Harvard and his doctorate from Vanderbilt.

Through his career, Andrews has taught at several universities, among them Tennessee, Florida State, Catholic, Georgetown and George Washington.

Today, Andrews is an editor, author, lecturer and educator

Andrews founded "The Shakespeare Guild" in 1987, which is a non-profit global organization to foster a deeper appreciation of the English-speaking world's most influential writer. After securing the blessing of its namesake, the Guild established the Sir John Gielgud Award for Excellence in the Dramatic Arts

"The purpose behind the guild was to create a large and more appreciative audience," Andrews explained, referring to the works of William Shakespeare. "The main reason I think I received this O.B.E. honor is for the last several years we (the guild) have presented annual awards in honor of Sir John Gielgud and this year the 2000 Gielgud Award was given to Kenneth Branagh in
