#### SQ'S SPRING ISSUE ON SHAKESPEAREAN PRODUCTION

Shakespeare Quarterly's annual survey of the most important Shakespearean productions in Great Britain and North America, published in the Winter issue in 1976, will appear in the Spring issue in 1977 and hereafter. One reason for the change is to facilitate coverage of late summer and early autumn performances that September deadlines have normally caused to be omitted from annual surveys in the past. Another is to enable the Quarterly to serve its readers not only with reviews of the season just concluded but also with previews of the season just ahead, particularly at the major summer Shakespearean festivals. But the Spring 1977 issue will contain more than reviews and previews of current productions. It will also feature articles and notes on significant productions of the past, assessments of new books and previews or current productions. It will also feature articles and notes on significant productions of the past, assessments of new books on Shakespearean theatre history, at least one interview with a well-known Shakespearean director or actor, and a dialogue on fifty years of British Shakespearean theatre between the late Robert Speaight and eminent London critic J. C. Trewin.

#### ANALYTICAL & ENUMERATIVE BIBLIOGRAPHY

The Bibliographical Society of Northern Illinois announces the establishment of Analytical & Enumerative Bibliography (AEB), a journal that will publish scholarly articles, notes, and reviews in bibliography, textual criticism, and publishing history. AEB will also have two regular features of especial note: an annual Index to Reviews of Bibliographical Scholarship, and a critical old-spelling edition of English Political Dialogues, 1641–1651, the texts of its twenty-one plays (with introductions and apparatuses) to appear seriatim, one in every other issue. Dues for membership and subscription are \$5.00 (£2.75) for one year, \$7.50 (£4.20) for two years. Libraries and other institutions may subscribe to AEB at a rate of \$8.00 (£4.50) for one year, \$13.00 (£7.25) for two. Inquiries, submissions, and subscriptions should be directed to William P.
