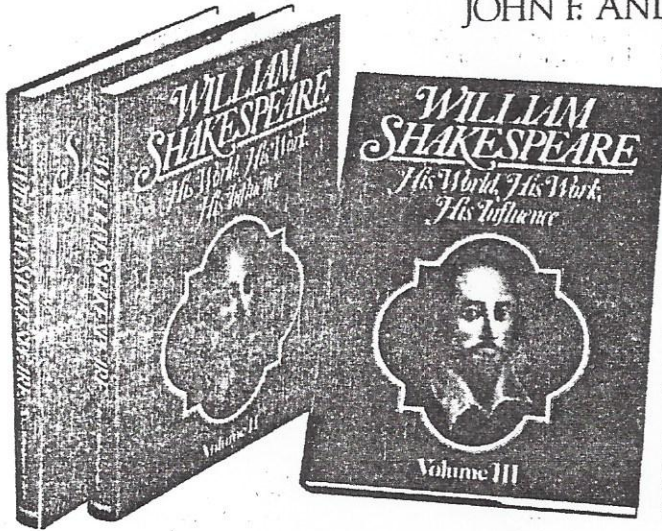


WILLIAM SHAKESPEARE

Ben Jonson's adulation of the bard has proved to be more than passionate rhetoric. Nearly four hundred years after his death: high school students continue to study the sonnets and plays, Shakespeare is a requirement for most college English majors, his life and work continue to arouse sensational controversy in the academic community, and in all parts of the world Shakespeare is performed and enjoyed. Now, for the first time, all aspects of Shakespeare studies are treated in one current, fully-indexed source.

The essays in Volume I create a backdrop for Shakespeare's age — the government under Elizabeth and James, the church, economic life, manners and dress, education, medicine and sanitation, to name a few of the topics covered. The volume can be read as profitably by students of renaissance English history as by Shakespeare enthusiasts.

The second volume is devoted to critical interpretations of Shakespeare's work — the tragedies, comedies, and son-

nets; Shakespeare's psychology; and a wonderfully elucidating piece on Shakespeare's poetic techniques that will make his language come alive to the twentieth-century ear.

Shakespeare's influence today on music, painting, teaching, popular culture, literary criticism, and, of course, acting and directing, is the subject of the third and final volume. Illustrations from such great institutions as the Folger Shakespeare Library and the British Museum appear throughout the set, but are concentrated in this volume.

Designed to stimulate fresh thinking and interpretation, this new, three-volume reference set is the first work to combine Shakespeare studies into one accessible source. Students, teachers, and general readers will find the most current thought on all aspects of the greatest figure in English literature—the man and his age, his art, and his influence.

The eminent contributors of the sixty articles have been drawn from a wide range of professions—from teaching to journalism to acting—and they offer insights from many vantage points. Authors include Anthony Burgess, Jacques Barzun, Stanley Wells, Jonathan Miller, Peter Ustinov, Sir John Gielgud, J. G. A. Pocock, and John Simon.

Volume I establishes Shakespeare in the historical, intellectual, cultural, and religious context that so influenced his writings. Among the articles are *The Church, Law and Legal Institutions, Medicine and Sanitation, and Theaters and the Dramatic Profession*.

Volume II focuses on the man and his artistry: biographical material; Shakespeare's thought and sensibility; his dramatic methods; and critical analyses of the sonnets, narrative poems, and plays.

The twenty essays include *Shakespeare's Tragicomedies and Romances, Shakespeare's Professional Career, Music in Shakespeare's Works, Shakespeare's Poetic Techniques, and Shakespeare's Language*.

Volume III surveys Shakespeare's reputation and influence from Elizabethan times to the present, with special attention on Shakespeare in performance and on his enormous impact on literature, pictorial art, and education. *Shakespeare on Film and Television, Shakespeare and the Modern Writer, Shakespeare and the Humanities, and Teaching and Studying Shakespeare Today* are among the twenty articles in this final volume.

The articles range in length from 5,000 to 15,000 words, and many are illustrated with materials from the Folger Shakespeare Library in Washington, D.C. Each essay concludes with a selected bibliography to guide the user to written materials, as well as to films, recordings, and other resources. A comprehensive index is included in Volume III.

These engaging and authoritative essays will make an invaluable addition to high school, college, public, and theater libraries, and will enhance all readers' appreciation of Shakespeare. ISBN 0-684-17851-6
