Gielgud's genius is set in stone

In his lifetime Sir John Gielgud suggested that the only reason he would be remembered would be "as the first queer actor to be knighted".

Last night a memorial stone unveiled in Westminster Abbey — beneath a statue of William Shakespeare and next to the ashes of Laurence Olivier — gave material proof of his greatness.

The ceremony to memorialise the actor, who died in 2000 aged 96, lured the greats of British theatre to Poets' Corner. Dame Judi Dench said that he had been an "unbelievable friend" who even "beat me at a sense of humour". She said that on her last visit to the abbey, a frail Gielgud had taken his seat, looked up at the ceiling and said: "Don't you think those are terribly unsuitable lights for a place like this?"

To Richard Eyre, the former

National Theatre director, Gielgud was the leading classical actor of the 20th century. He said his acting and immersion in Shakespeare's biggest parts had done more than anything else to "create the circumstances that led to the foundation of the Royal Shakespeare Company and the National Theatre".

He said that Gielgud was "engagingly self-deprecating" and could be "caustic but unmalicious". He added, to appreciative nods, that he was a "marvellously droll raconteur".

Sir David Hare said that one of the myths about Gielgud "held by stupid people" was that he was old-fashioned. On the contrary, Hare said, Gielgud performed in many new plays and between 1968 and 1977 created seven original leading roles. He asked: "How many living actors come close either in commitment or modernity?"

Before reading an extract, Ian said: 'All I know of him is a witty tongue and a keen eye, but also a generosity.

Gielgud honoured in Poets' Corner of Westminster Abbey

A MEMORIAL stone honouring the late Sir John Gielgud has been unveiled at Westminster Abbey. It is the first time in 17 years that an actor has been commemorated in the Abbey's south transept, with Dame Peggy Ashcroft the last in 2005.

Sir John, an Oscar award-winning

Sir John, an Oscar award-winning British actor and director, who was a master of Shakespearean roles, died aged 96 in May 2000.

The stone is in the Abbey's south transept, joining the memorials of other greats from the world of acting including Sir Laurence Olivier and Dame Sybil Thorndike. A section of the transept has become known informally as Poets' Corner, due to the dozens of poets and playwrights commemorated or buried there, including William Shakespeare and Charles Dickens.

Gielgud was knighted in 1953 and appointed to the Order of Merit in 1996.

The memorial, created

by the letter carver sculp-tor Wayne Hart, is made from a block of highly polished Purbeck blue marble.
