Dr. Braithwaite went on to publish a number of other works, and he eventually became the inaugural AMBASSADOR TO THE UNITED NATIONS from his native Guyana. During a dialogue with JOHN ANDREWS, he'll talk about a stage adaptation of TO SIR, WITH LOVE that is being devised for a prestigious West End theatre in London.

Dr. Payzant oversaw a sequence of reforms that increased student performance in every single category of assessment. Boston is now regarded as a national model for urban instruction, and the inspirational figure who transformed its pedagogical

Washington-area constituents and their guests will want to meet this charming speaker. Mr. Suarez came to PBS by way of NATIONAL PUBLIC RADIO, where he had been the moderator of TALK OF THE NATION since 1993.

Prior to his arrival at NPR, he had spent seven years covering local, national, and international developments for NBC station WMAQ-TV in Chicago. His experience in on-air journalism has also included stints with the Los Angeles bureau of CNN, with the Rome office of CBS RADIO, and with a variety of American and British news services in London. Over the years he has narrated, anchored, or reported for a number of documentaries, among them Follow the Money (PBS in 1997), The Journey Home (PBS in 2004), By the People (PBS in 2004), and Who Speaks for Islam? (LINKTV in 2005). In 2004 Mr. Suarez was an essayist for BBC RADIO 4, joining a group of U.S.-based writers on a new program called State of the Union, a sequel to the late ALISTAIR COOKE's legendary Letter from America. He currently hosts a monthly series, America Abroad, for PUBLIC RADIO INTERNATIONAL, and several related attractions for AMERICAN PUBLIC MEDIA.

SEMPER FIDEL? WHAT WILL CASTRO'S CUBAN LEGACY BE AFTER HE EXPIRES?

After a half-century of hostility and severed relationships, the United States will soon face a Cuba without Fidel Castro. What will the transition entail for each country? DR. JULIA SWEIG, an

authority on Cuba who recently wrote an article on "Fidel's Final Victory" for Foreign Affairs, will offer a valuable perspective on the issues and policy options for both nations. Dr. Sweig's Inside the Cuban Revolution: Fidel Castro and the Urban Underground (2002) earned the AMERICAN HIS-TORICAL ASSOCIATION'S Herbert Feis Award for best book of the year by an independent scholar.



Her latest volume is Friendly Fire: Losing Friends and Making Enemies in the Anti-American Century (2006). Dr.

ANTHONY H. CORDESMAN DISCUSSES AFGHANISTAN, THE TALIBAN, AND NATO

After what appeared to be a decisive victory in Afghanistan, the United States and its allies now face serious challenges from a Taliban that has regrouped in neighboring Pakistan and is said



to be preparing a spring offensive. How serious is this new threat, and to what extent can America rely upon its NATO partners to help defend against it? These are the kinds of questions that Middle East authority ANTHONY CORDESMAN will pose during a luncheon session that has been arranged by the WOMAN'S NATIONAL DEMOCRATIC CLUB. Mr. Cordesman holds the exalted Arleigh H. Burke Chair at

the CENTER FOR STRATEGIC AND INTERNATIONAL STUDIES and is a national security analyst for ABC NEWS. His commentary on such conflicts as the Gulf War, Operation Desert Fox, Kosovo, Afghanistan, and Iraq. Before he became affiliated with CSIS, Dr. Cordesman was an assistant to SENATOR JOHN MCCAIN, with particular emphasis on the Arizona legislator's

role on the SENATE ARMED SERVICES COMMITTEE. Prior to that he served as director of intelligence assessment in the OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY OF DEFENSE. He has had numerous foreign assignments, including posts in

Lebanon, Egypt, and Iran, and he has worked extensively in Saudi Arabia and in the Persian Gulf. Dr. Cordesman is the author of more than twenty books, among them *The Iraq War*, *Saudi Arabia Enters the 21st Century*, *The Lessons of Afghanistan*, and *Terrorism*, *Asymmetric Warfare*, and *Weapons of Mass Destruction*.

A CHANCE TO HEAR NOBEL LAUREATE WOLE SOYINKA AT THE COSMOS CLUB

A world-renowned playwright and poet, a man who has long been revered as one of Africa's leading writers and activists, has been selected for the 2007 JOHN P. MCGOVERN AWARD IN LITERATURE at the COSMOS CLUB. A Nigerian, WOLE SOYINKA completed his graduate training at the University of Leeds in England, and he is the author of more than thirty book-length publications: plays, poetry, fiction, critical essays, and memoirs. In 1986, when he received the NOBEL PRIZE IN LITERATURE,

the ROYAL SWEDISH ACADEMY described him as an artist "who in a wide cultural perspective and with poetic overtones fashions the drama of existence." From the outset of his remarkable

career Mr. Soyinka has been a fearless fighter for human rights around the world. He was imprisoned in his native country for two years in the 1960s and was under a death sentence in the 1990s for criticizing the dictator who
